

RULE OF 8870

Using the 8870 Formula to ascertain a birth date can be a tremendous help to the genealogist when checking tombstone dates.

For instance, if a tombstone records that a person died 6 May 1889 and was 71 years, 7 months, and 9 days old but no date of birth is listed, here is a quick way to get the date of birth.

YEAR / MONTH / DAY

Died 6 May 1889 18890506

Subtract age at death <u>- 710709</u> (71 yrs, 7 mo, 9 days)

18179797

Subtract the formula - 8870 (a constant)

18170927 (Born 1817, Sept. 27)
